From the Pastor: "Love One Another"

"Above all maintain constant love for one another, for love covers a multitude of sins." 1 Peter 4:8 Also see 1 Cor. 13

Who do we want to be as individual Christians and as a church? These next few weeks will help determine that. I believe the best place to start is with love through Jesus Christ. Who does Jesus want us to be and how do we get there? Peter, John, Paul and Jesus all say we must "love one another." Peter adds "love covers a multitude of sins." What does that mean?

To "cover" sin is to forgive it, and forgiveness is associated with love. The best example of a love that covers sin is Jesus' sacrificial death on our behalf Jesus' prayer from the cross, "Father, forgive them," says it all (Luke 23:34). Jesus' bearing of our iniquities was an undeniable act of love. In fact, Jesus did more than just cover our sin; He did away with it completely (Hebrews 6:5).

In 1 Peter 4:8, the apostle is talking about interpersonal relationships. As believers we reflect the love of God by forgiving others. Jesus told His disciples, "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another" (John 13:34-35).

Love also covers over a multitude of sins in that it does not gossip about sin. Rather than share the offences of our brothers and sisters in Christ with anyone who will listen, we exercise discretion and restraint.

Love does not cover over a multitude of sin by sweeping matters under the rug. Some have appealed to the forgiving nature of love in their

attempt to hide indiscretion. For example, rather than report child abuse, a church might cover it up. This is not what true love does. Love protects by helping both the victim and the offender, and it also strives to prevent further offenses. Love covering sin also does not mean we disregard our own emotions or ignore our personal boundaries. We cannot "cover" sin by denying that it hurt us. We cover sin by acknowledging it and then extending the forgiveness God has given us to others.

Another way that love covers over a multitude of sins is choosing not to take offense at everything. Some sins against us are not worth confronting. Personal slights, snide or ignorant remarks, and minor annoyances can be easily forgiven for the sake of love. The world most often chooses to be offended these days. Do we follow the world or Jesus? If we are patient, not envious or self-seeking, we are much less likely to even take offense. Acting in love means we put others before ourselves. Love can cover a multitude of sin in that, when we act in true love, we are prone to overlook minor offenses, tolerate the provocations, and forgive the sin.

As we move through a time of uncertainty and change, it is my hope and prayer that at Audubon, we listen to Peter, John, Paul and Jesus...their witness recorded in Scripture, and love one another... it covers a multitude of sins, including ours!

The Current United Methodist Position on Human Sexuality (compiled

from <http://www.umc.org/what-we-believe/human-sexuality-backgrounder>)

We affirm that all persons are individuals of sacred worth, created in the image of God and that all persons need the ministry of the church.

We affirm that God's grace is available to all. We will seek to live together in Christian community, welcoming, forgiving and loving one another, as Christ has loved and accepted us.

We implore families and churches not to reject or condemn lesbian and gay members and friends. We commit ourselves to be in ministry for and with all persons.

Certain basic human rights and civil liberties are due all persons. We are committed to supporting those rights and liberties for all persons, regardless of sexual orientation.

We see a clear issue of simple justice in protecting the rightful claims where people have shared material resources, pensions, guardian relationships, mutual powers of attorney, and other such lawful claims typically attendant to contractual relationships that involve shared contributions, responsibilities, and liabilities, and equal protection before the law. Moreover, we support efforts to stop violence and other forms of coercion against all persons, regardless of sexual orientation."

The United Methodist Church does not condone the practice of homosexuality and considers this practice incompatible with Christian teaching.

The United Methodist Church bans the ordination of "self-avowed practicing homosexuals," and it forbids the performance of same-gender unions in the denomination's sanctuaries and by its clergy in any setting.

Sexuality is God's good gift to all persons. We call everyone to responsible stewardship of this sacred gift. Although all persons are sexual beings whether or not they are married, sexual relations are affirmed only with the covenant of monogamous, heterosexual marriage."

Mission News by Bruce Krout

What a pleasure it has been to team up with two wonderful ladies while we prepared to begin our new community support venture “**Cancer with Hope**”.

The first team member is Taylor Whylings who is employed as a nurse within the cancer unit of the University of Pennsylvania. The second is Carol Fennimore who is presently battling non-Hodgkin's lymphoma (NHL). It is amazing to me that either would step forward to be a part of this ministry.

Taylor works at the #1 rated cancer hospital in our region and #10 in our nation. She is part of a surgical team who helps prepare patients for their surgery. For Taylor to volunteer for “Cancer with Hope” is astounding to me. To me it's like a car mechanic who after eight-hours of car repair is willing to work on a couple of more cars at the end of the day. To do that, on top of family responsibilities with two young grammar school-aged children, is impressive. Credit also goes to her husband Joe, an Audubon policeman, who gets “Dad time” while Taylor is at our meetings.

Carol Fennimore's story is remarkable for a different reason. She is involved with the University of Pennsylvania cancer program from the patient end. Not long-ago Carol noticed a bulge in her neck and after visiting a number of doctors determined that her lymph node was enlarged due to non-Hodgkin lymphoma. This is the 7th most common cancer type that begins in the cells of the lymph nodes. The lymph system is part of the immune system that protects the body from infection and disease. There is often a cure for Hodgkin lymphoma, but not for non-Hodgkin lymphoma that, unfortunately, Carol is battling. With NHL, you hope for remission or temporary recovery. She has had chemotherapy treatment for 6 months. The last treatment was in November that Carol reported as “being a rough ten days”. A recent body scan determined that Carol's prognosis was positive, as her lymph nodes had shrunk considerably following the November chemo.

Carol has demonstrated her belief in God throughout her retirement and her health ordeal. Repeatedly she has asked God “to use me.” She has had her down times for sure, but she knows to ask

Him for strength and courage to get through the tough times. “Send me an angel” has been requested periodically. On a number of occasions Carol has said to me that she’s fine with “whatever God has for me”. Carol has trusted in God many times throughout her life, believing, “It’s in His hands.”

As we go forward in our new cancer ministry, our team knows that we need to trust in God for wisdom and for things to happen in His time. In last month’s newsletter, Pastor Walt talked about professional football players trusting in the Lord, whether good or bad things happen. Carol Fennimore is showing that same trust in her life and I am so honored to be involved with her and Taylor in the “Cancer with Hope” support program. I believe all three of us have asked God to “use me.”

I will leave you with the same verse Pastor Walt used, as well:

“Trust in the LORD with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways submit to him, and he will make your paths straight.” Proverbs 3:5-6 NIV

Sharing God’s word and love, however we can, is our mission.
