Mission News by Bruce Krout

I recently had an enjoyable lunch with the Rutgers (New Brunswick) Campus Director of International Students Inc., David Mannon. One of his first comments to me was how grateful he is for the consistency of mission support from our AUMC and individuals from our Church, as well.

Since the Rutgers University spring break of March 2020, when things shut down due to the pandemic, David's ministry has had to be virtual. He said he learned new techniques for interacting and evangelizing with international students. One major change has been to be more focused and personal



when interacting through Zoom meetings. In the fall when the Rutgers University campus opens up again and we're back to our new normal, David will continue to utilize this newly adopted technique of digging deeper into the students' personal life.

David spoke about his usual interaction with the Asian students he interacted with this past school year. Keeping in mind that the major focus and interest of the students is learning English as a second language (ESL) primarily. He would begin by asking, "What are you thankful for?". Secondly, he asks, "What difficulties are you experiencing in your life?". By asking these sensitive questions David believes it helps in deepening their relationship. He often would end the sessions with a Bible verse.

David's ISI volunteer outreach team looks to be expanding with a young man named Paul whose parents immigrated from Taiwan. Another Livingston campus student named Gabriel who was born in Hong Kong and wants to be a volunteer for ISI is presently teaching at a nearby charter school. "Befriending every international student at Rutgers" is David's worthy goal and a smart way to get the Word into the Biblically closed parts of the world.



<u>Health & Wellness – Short and Sweet</u> *"Enjoy the Summer While Staying Safe"*

Last month I posed 2 questions: "Is it Post-Pandemic time?" and "How does the lifting of restrictions affect each one of us?" It concerns me when I see the Ocean City or Wildwood boardwalk on the news. It is just as crowded as before the pandemic. There are occasional persons

with a mask, but social distancing is nonexistent. With crowds like this, what will the pandemic situation be by the end of July? The seashore is only one example along with sports stadium crowds, amusement/theme parks, and large picnic gatherings to name a few.

You **can** participate in these types of gatherings and fun activities! Just do so **wisely**. Here are some suggestions:

- Visit the beach at off times and don't set up your umbrella and chairs close to other families. Remember 6 feet. Try to find less touristy beaches.
- Enjoy the boardwalk on off hours morning and afternoon and later in the evening. Consider a mask especially when you browse the boardwalk stores.
- Sports venues: Wear a mask to protect yourself. Those cheering around you can spread germs by droplet.
- Amusement and theme parks: Week-ends and holidays are usually more crowded, so visit during a week day. Wear a mask to protect yourself.
- Picnics: Avoid large gatherings. Enjoy this activity with family and friends you know. Have a mask with you.
- Museums and Movie theaters: These tend to be large indoor spaces, so risk is very low. Still consider a mask. Theaters are quite safe being sanitized between each viewing. Wear a mask except when enjoying the snacks available.

Exercise: Get outside and enjoy the fresh air and beauty of summer! Outdoor exercise is preferable as every breath takes in clean healthy air. If you are exercising with a group maintain safe distancing. Enjoy a walk around Haddon Lake or any other County park.

Road Trips: Plan a day trip and take food with you to have a picnic. There are so many great places near Audubon to work into a day trip. Go to the Poconos, drive along the Hudson River, follow Ocean Drive from Brigantine to Cape May, or visit the Cape May Zoo. The possibilities are endless! <u>One extreme word of caution</u> – Some people, after being cooped up inside for over a year, can't wait to get out onto the road and may be careless and inconsiderate of other drivers. So be mindful of the speed limit and check your mirrors frequently.

Riding in a taxi – wear a mask and keep the windows open.

If you are unvaccinated always wear a mask and social distance regardless of where you are and with whom.

When you are in a public setting, YOU need to decide what you want to do. Continue wearing your mask? Continue to social distance?
