



From the pastor's desk



How was your Lenten journey? Did you get in touch with yourself during this time to find out who you really are and whose you truly are? Did you feel that some people were praying for you and your family? Did you find the sweetness of the Holy Spirit... while in the midst of your struggles... while partaking the daily bread of scripture reading?

Forty days of your Lenten journey has nearly passed and we are getting closer to the sunrise of Easter; the day of the Lord's resurrection.

"Resurrection is a sense of direction." I had to ponder what it means to me.

"... He is going ahead of you to Galilee" "Go... make disciples..." "Remember I am with you always, to the end of the age."

A sense of direction... in each of the gospels, the resurrection moves people away from the tomb in the direction of the world. The direction is away from death and toward life.

A sense of direction... "Why do you seek the living among the dead?"

The resurrection invites -- no -- the resurrection demands that we orient ourselves in a new direction. What was, no longer is. In order to meet the risen Christ in Galilee, in order to make disciples, in order to know Christ with us even to the end of the age, in order to be actually free and happy, we have to turn our backs on the empty tomb of the past and let the resurrection orient us in a new direction. He is going before you to Galilee ... already ahead of us, inviting us into a lively future with him in our life and in the work we are called to do.

"Resurrection is a sense of direction." How is it so for you? When you meditate on the phrase, where does it take you?

May you be blessed this season of Eastertide with a sense of direction. **Christ is risen!**

Remember when Pastor Jisun first came to AUMC and she met us all through the Meet and Greet meetings? From those meetings, we had the opportunity to vote on the five most important things we wanted to do here at AUMC? As a result of our voting, we identified the five areas we wanted to focus on: Outreach, Publicity, Infrastructure, Kindness, and our Online Presence.

Here is the latest regarding these five areas and your opportunity to become involved as a “contributor” if you would be interested. Being a contributor means that you would be involved in the work of the committee but would not have to attend meetings.

Outreach: This team is led by Mark VanArnam. He and his team have been working tirelessly.

Post cards have been mailed to every home in Audubon and Mt. Ephraim, and you may have received the second one; they have partnered with the Food Pantry at St. Luke’s in Collingswood; and they have begun a weekly challenge to us.

Publicity: This team is led by Diane Stanley. Her team has contributed to the creation of the post card that was mailed to the community and are responsible for creating and placing the banners in front of the church. Infrastructure: This team is led by Barry Zane. He and his team did an initial walk-through of the facilities last Spring to see where we might want to make improvements. Mission News by Bruce Krout

While you are devouring chocolate bunnies and marshmallow chicks this time of year, I have an interesting story from Steve Quigg of Mission Safety International. I asked him to share his best story that he could recall from his years as a missionary pilot. For twenty years he and his wife Gail were living in Africa as United Methodist flight missionaries. The terrain in the Congo or Nigeria was not easy for traveling by car or truck. There were isolated villages that needed supplies brought in by plane. At one time, Steve was asked to fly in hundreds of chicks to villages numerous times as part of an agricultural enrichment program.

Flying into these villages to get someone who needed medical attention was not uncommon. Often there were no roads in these locations, so a medical emergency is often a death sentence. Steve remembered flying individuals to medical facilities and returning them back home later. What a rewarding experience and memory!

After decades of working in aviation ministries providing technical and logistical support, Steve has recently pivoted to Mission Safety International whose purpose is to assist Christian missionary aviation organizations. The assistance includes reviewing safety manuals, training, and procedures

to insure safe flights. Steve and his wife recently moved to the Lancaster, PA area, which allows them to work for MSI and be close to their three parents who are well into their mid-90's.

Of course, the pandemic has been challenging to Steve when setting up safety seminars, such as the one held recently in Spokane, WA at Moody Aviation.

International travel to places such as New Guinea, South Africa, and the Philippines has been put on hold due to month-long quarantine restrictions that would be required.

Steve appreciates our financial support along with continued prayers for their worthy ministry of "Making safety a way of life for missionary aviators everywhere.". (www.missafety.org)

Children's Ministry – Anne Simpson.

Every year the children of our church have looked forward to making resurrection rolls. Since it can't be done in person I'm writing the recipe. It's a fun and tasty way to help celebrate Jesus' resurrection. You might want to read Mark 15:42-47 before you begin.

Resurrection Rolls

Materials needed:

Large marshmallows

Melted butter or margarine

Cinnamon sugar mixture

Crescent rolls(ready to bake)

Use the materials as symbols to tell the story.

The marshmallow represents Jesus after being removed from the cross.

Roll the marshmallow in melted butter. This represents the anointing oil on Jesus' body.

Then roll it in cinnamon sugar to represent the anointing spices.

Place marshmallow on crescent roll & roll it up so it is completely sealed. This is very important.

The roll represents the tomb.

Bake 375° for 10 minutes.

While roll is still warm, have children open the roll. THE TOMB IS EMPTY.

Health & Wellness – Short and Sweet

“Do we still need to wear masks and social distance?”

The new strains of COVID 19 are airborne and can spread quickly. Even if you have received the vaccine, you can still contract a new strain from someone just by inhaling and then spreading to another when you exhale, *Therefore, we must still wear masks and social distance to protect ourselves and others.*

From the Centers for Disease Control (CDC):
(Posted March 18)

Now that the U.S. is vaccinating roughly 2 million people per day, the CDC has released [the first set of guidelines](#) detailing the activities those who’ve been vaccinated can and can’t do.

This, of course, applies to wearing masks. Please read further to figure out how the CDC guidance on wearing masks post-vaccination affects you:

Two weeks after receiving your final dose of the COVID-19 vaccine, the CDC states you can interact with other fully vaccinated people inside without the need to social distance.

If some members of your group *have not* received the vaccine, it all comes down to common sense; if you’re in the presence of someone who’s considered high-risk, for example, masks should still be worn.

This also applies to the public in general, as many people still haven’t gotten a vaccination. So, when you find yourself in a public setting, the CDC states that you should:

- Continue wearing your mask.
- Continue to social distance.
- Avoid large gatherings.
- Follow current CDC and state travel advisories.

Also please note that should you experience any coronavirus symptoms, you should still get tested to confirm whether or not you have the disease. (End of posted content)




